Baxter Bridge

The North Okanagan Enhanced Boat patrol update was given by Conservation Officers (CO’s). The patrols covered Mabel, Mara, Kalamalka Lakes and Lower Shuswap River. They were sponsored by the RDNO Electoral Areas, Enderby and a new supporter, Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association (TOTA). Shuswap River had the highest number of contacts with river users within the 6 dedicated CO’s patrols for the watercourse. Lifejacket use has increased from previous years with only 62% of vessels in non-compliance (the lowest in the patrolled area). There were 471 vessels and 617 individuals checked, with 18 tickets and 291 warnings issued. Orders to shore accounted for 18 vessels (too dangerous to operate). Vessels that were 100% compliant numbered 180 vessels. There were 327 enforcement actions taken on watercrafts. The CO’s found that most of boat users were locals and had been checked in previous years. Conflicts between tubers and vessels were difficult for the officers to deal with. They were aware of incidents happening but it is hard for them to be on hand when these confrontations happened. They themselves had to be very careful when driving through the tubers.

The CO’s found that many tubers were found to be inadequately prepared for being on the river safely. A dangerous situation they noticed is that some tubers tie many of their floats together, this can result in the group being caught behind a log jam and sucking everyone under. The water is very powerful; it is relentless and unforgiving in situations like this. A person cannot swim their way out. A suggestion for solutions would be to have more education available to the users about the dangers of the river.

Mara lake had 2 patrols and they checked 38 vessels and 110 people; 5 tickets and 95 warnings were issued with 9 orders for vessels to be taken to shore. Five vessels were 100% compliant and 69 actions of enforcement taken. The total compliance rate at 87%.

The Conservation Officers have noticed a significant decrease in out of area visitors and a large increase in local residents. This could be why they are seeing more compliance to safety requirements and less unlicensed. They received many kudos from boaters who expressed gratitude for seeing them on the water.

A Development Variance Permit was granted for a property in Mara along highway 97A; to reduce setbacks for a home and garage from the highway right of way.

The Electoral Area Directors are considering having a “youth member” sitting on our Advisor Planning Committee (APC). A youth would be someone between 16 and 21 years. The APC give input to the RDNO on issues dealing with to land use, preparation and adoption of official community plans, or proposed bylaws or permits. At times I use them as a sounding board to what they are hearing in the community.

On Grandview Bench 2 properties were found to be building without a building permit. The RDNO Board agreed to put a Notice on Title that they were in contravention of the building bylaw. RDNO will continue trying to work with the owners to find a solution to bring them into compliance. If, however there is no willingness to work with staff there are other tools the RDNO can use to bring about a resolution. These can range from a variety of legal actions not excluding demolition and hefty fines.
