Fight for Turf in Spring but Flock for Safety in Winter

A flash of orange in early spring when migrating robins return is a welcome sight, but this year a flock of robins was spotted here in winter. It's surprising to see a large flock in December but even more surprising when a flock of 43 sticks around all winter. It makes you curious.

We expect to see a robin or two in early spring when insects and worms become available. They cheerily call out to attract mates and aggressively defend the territory where they will raise several broods over the coming months. Most robins do migrate. The individual/pairs robins of spring and summer stay around our yards but the robins who over-winter demonstrate a different kind of behaviour. In winter, most will stay as a group moving from tree to tree rather than staying in one place and defending a territory.

If robins can find enough fruit sources to feed on, they will stay the winter. It's not the weather that makes them want to migrate, it's the availability of food. Moving as a group, they search for fruit trees including ornamental crabapple and mountain ash trees. In the past 10 years wintering flocks have been sighted in most of southern Canada (ebird.org/ebirdmap/amerob? or see map). Many, perhaps most, over-wintering form flocks. They are quite hardy birds and can do well for themselves so long as there is a good supply of fruit on trees. They should be able to weather a few short cold snaps.

When a flock of robins arrive to feed, some may try to drive others away. This shows how critical the food source is. Without a steady supply of food, the robins will lack the ability to stay warm during the cold nights of winter. Fruit is also not particularly high in energy, so the robins must eat a great amount of it.

It is risky to decide to stay the winter, but migration itself is also high risk. It's estimated by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources that 20-30 percent of hatch-year migrating birds die on the trip. Another obvious advantage is that when spring does arrive, the birds that stayed will be first to choose their territories, find mates, and start a brood. Even a week's head start gives them the chance to produce more healthy offspring than a competitor.

When spring rolls around, the flocks split up. Suddenly we start seeing robins yanking worms out of our yards again, and it's easy to assume they've all "returned" from migration. But what we're seeing is in part a switch from being non territorial in the winter time to aggressively defending a territory in advance of courting and raising chicks. This is a behavioural switch that's quite common in birds.



Emergency Preparedness/Evacuation Plan (April 2019)

We are still waiting to hear back regarding the Province providing funding for the revision of the 2005 Evacuation Plan. Obviously, it would make sense to get started sooner rather than later. Please consider providing input into the process.

You may have noticed that there are two groups working on fire prevention in the valley. The FireSmart Steering Committee has met several times since the FireSmart presentation at the Hall last fall. The function of this group is largely confined to educating homeowners about how to reduce the chance of wildfire air born sparks and embers taking hold and destroying homes and property. The Local Planning Groups (LPG) supports this effort, with some people being involved with both groups. The Local Planning Groups (LPG), although having no official capacity, attempt to provide additional functions with a "neighbour helping neighbour" approach.

The reality is that Kingfisher is over an hour away from the Vernon Fire Zone site (Predator Ridge) and 10-15 minutes by helicopter from Salmon Arm, assuming that one is dispatched immediately. LPG attempt to ascertain available local resources and develop a communication system to deploy them in a particularly safe manner. The Local Planning Groups (LPG) could also be helpful in situations other than fire (floods, road closures, power outages, landslides, etc.)

- locate and maintain sources of water;
- ascertain vulnerable residents that may need assistance during an emergency; and,
- perhaps most importantly, attempt to short circuit rumours which spread misinformation.

FireSmart Tip of the Month

Regular yard cleanups significantly decrease the risk of losing your home to a wildfire.

Remember that over 50% of homes lost in wildfires are due to windborne sparks and embers rather than as a result of direct contact with flames. Focus on Zone 1, within 10 metres of your home, and especially on the first 1.5 metres.

Embers and sparks can collect under decks. Sheath in the base of decks with fire resistant materials or 3mm screening.

Be ready for Yard Waste Cleanup Day, May 19th, and get those rakes and pruners working.
