

Thank you to those who joined the Directors at the AGM on Saturday the 23rd. Directors gave their reports and presented the financial statements for 2023. Financial statements are posted at the Hall. New Director Pat Burnett was welcomed, making the group 9 members strong with all current Directors agreeing to stay on.

In 2023, the hall was used 312 times! These included a variety of activities, events and rentals.

The Directors held 10 meetings in 2023. During the year, 11 community members attended for a variety of reasons: starting a first responders group, making a donation, collaborating on event planning, new parents and baby came for Baby Welcome cheque, a pickleball rep requesting help to get funding for resurfacing tennis court, History committee requesting support for and sponsorship of a funding application to RDNO for history project signage.

Typically, the Directors do not take on new initiatives but offer our support and suggestions.

Other highlights include:

- Agreed to share Chairperson Role.
- KCS Scholarship Committee disbanded as the number of graduates is much reduced.
- Updated Scholarship application and requirements.
- Reviewed and updated the position descriptions for each role. Each Director is documenting the 'how to' details of their role to assist the transition to new Directors as part of succession.
- Agreed to the temporary placement of a storage shed on hall property to house Mabel Lake Water Utility equipment. RDNO pays a nominal annual fee for the use of the site.
- Signed the school lease agreement.
- Old playground structures removed.
- With the resignations of 2 Directors during the year, two new Directors joined: Sandra Scott in September 2023 and Alana Brookes in early 2024.
- Created and approved a new hall rental policy. Thanks to Riverside hall for sharing their policy with us.
- Started the 'Meet the Director' articles for the newsletter.
- Hired new Janitor, Teri and Colin of OKGN Maintenance

Counting Our Winter Birds 2024 Submitted by: Jan Lacko

One week after we were in the grip of -30 degree C temperatures, it was +1 degree C January 21, the day of this year's Kingfisher bird count. Six volunteers were out and spotted a total of 345 birds across 25 species.

Common winter residents were spotted. We saw nuthatches, pine siskins, goldfinches, black-capped and chestnutbacked chickadees, Stellar's jays, dippers, ravens, crows and three kinds of woodpeckers. On and near the water we saw Trumpeter swans, many Mallards, Barrow's Goldeneye, Common Mergansers, Eagles, and heard a Kingfisher. Though they were seen during the count week, we couldn't count Ruffed Grouse, Barred Owls, Great Blue Heron, Canada Geese, Black-billed Magpies or the Pacific Wren.

Two Pied-billed Grebe were counted on Mabel Lake. These small, chunky, very brown swimming birds have two distinct vertical bars on each side of their bills. Other notable sightings were a group of fifty European Starlings and eight Ringnecked ducks.

We missed seeing Bufflehead, Golden-crowned Kinglets, Juncos, and Red Crossbills on this year's count. Maybe our unusual weather conditions made these usual visitors hard to find. The count was again a great way to pause and appreciate the diversity of our environment. The potluck was fun, the food was great, and we hope you'll feel welcome to join us next time!

FUEL LOAD REDUCTION

Rain is good... It's been great to have some warm sunny days. But, here a few quotes from the BC Wildfire Service Seasonal Outlook:

"As of February 1, the BC River Forecast Centre reported an extremely low provincial snowpack, averaging 61per cent of normal across British Columbia. The low snowpack will limit surface runoff, stream flows, and fuel moisture recharge which could limit drought recovery into summer 2024."

" The current long-range forecasts suggest a high potential for an active spring wildfire season in British Columbia. Once fuels and forests are snow-free, elevated fire activity is anticipated this spring. A spring wildfire season is common in British Columbia."

"May and June are typically the rainiest months in the B.C. Interior. The amount and duration of rain events during this period influences the length and intensity of the core wildfire season. Conditions have the potential to improve if widespread, continuous rain is received this spring. It is too early to tell though; long-range weather forecasts, especially for precipitation, are unreliable. However, meteorologists are skeptical that sufficient rainfall will occur. Until we experience significant and prolonged rains, the elevated drought will continue to support the potential for easy ignition and rapid wildfire growth."

If you search BC Wildfire Seasonal Outlook, you will find a page or two of more information as well as an hour and a half video with several speakers on related topics.

Spring is a great time to FireSmart around your house and property by reducing the fuel load. Search for: **Firesmart BC** for useful information. If you have determined that burning debris is your option, make sure to check the venting index before you burn. Looking out the window for a sunny, cloudy or rainy day is often not the most accurate predictor of good venting conditions. Search for: **Ventilation Index Interactive Map-GIS Online** This site will ask you to "click and agree" to it's terms and conditions. The first paragraph is a rather short read, which includes a link in blue: "Read more about the requirements of this regulation"... By following the venting conditions and requirements you will greatly reduce the chance of "smoking-up" the neighborhood. Another informative site can be found by searching: **open burning bc** This site explains the different categories of fires and their burning requirements.

This might also be a good time of year to talk to your neighbors about how to improve your neighborhood's response to a fire or other emergencies. The Province has prepared a very useful and easy to follow brochure to help neighbors make plans to deal with emergencies. The idea is that small clusters of homeowners can respond in an organized manner. An online copy of the brochure can be found by searching: **Neighborhood Preparedness Guide**... There are also hard copies of this brochure circulating around the community. I have ordered many more of these brochures. When they arrive, I will put them out at convenient locations. You can also easily order brochures and have them mailed to you by scrolling down on the above search to find the Crown Publications link.

A spring wildfire season before "green-up" is common in British Columbia. Most of the spring and fall fires are human caused. Burning to reduce the fuel load is a recognized method if it is done with caution and under the right circumstances. At the time of this writing, there are already fire bans in parts of British Columbia.

There may be an opportunity for firefighter training this spring. If interested, please call 250-838-6525 and I will try to connect you to that training. If in the past you have taken the S100 basic training, you can go online and search for the S100 a course and re-certify.
