

The Strawberry Tea is a longstanding Kingfisher event that began several decades ago. It was traditionally hosted by the famous Kingfisher Kitchen Band at the property of Isabel and Wilfred Simard. Each year a crew of helpers moved the piano, tables and chairs to and from the property. For several years, it was held on a Thursday afternoon, the day the 'men came down from camp'. The Kitchen Band provided the Strawberry shortcake and provided the music.

Eventually the event was moved to the hall where it continues on each July. The cakes have often featured Isabel Simard's famous short cake recipe, passed on over the years.

## Register for the RDNO FireSmart Chipping Program

The Regional District of North Okanagan (RDNO) is launching two FireSmart™ pilot programs for its Electoral Area residents - the RDNO FireSmart Chipping Program and the RDNO FireSmart Home Assessment Program.

FireSmart is a national program designed to help communities and homeowners reduce the risk of wildfire damage around their properties. It involves a series of proactive measures and best practices to make properties and communities more resilient to the wildfire threat. Implementing FireSmart practices is a shared responsibility among homeowners, communities, and governments, ensuring a safer and more resilient environment for everyone.

The FireSmart Chipping Program is designed to help residents reduce wildfire risks by providing free chipping services for tree branches, shrubs, and other woody debris. It encourages homeowners to clear their properties of potential fire hazards, promoting a safer environment for all. This program is open to all residents of RDNO Electoral Areas B, C, D, E, or F. Residents can sign up for the program by visiting www.rdno.ca/firesmart/chipping program. Please note that limited time-slots are available and that each resident is eligible for one pick-up for the year 2025.

The FireSmart Home Assessment Program offers residents personalized assessments of their properties to identify potential wildfire risks and provide recommendations for mitigation. A trained Local FireSmart Representative will conduct these assessments, helping homeowners take proactive steps to protect their homes and communities. This program is open to all residents of Electoral Areas B, C, D, E, or F. Residents can sign up to receive an assessment by visiting www.rdno.ca/firesmart/homeassessment. Please note that limited time-slots are available, and assessment lead times may vary.

"We are dedicated to providing high-quality services and fostering a safe and sustainable community", stated Bob Fleming, Chair of the Electoral Area Advisory Committee and Director of Electoral Area B. "Through initiatives like these, we continue to prioritize the well-being of our residents and the protection of the Okanagan's natural environment. These programs are vital steps in ensuring that our residents are well-prepared."

The Kingfisher Interpretive Centre Society is excited to welcome back an opportunity, for anyone interested, to assist with a **public Salmon fry release**. Salmon Sunday will be taking place on **Sunday June 29th from 10:00am – 12:00**. This free, family event will provide an occasion to release baby salmon into the scenic Shuswap River, wish them good luck and watch them swim away. There are over 10,000 Chinook salmon to release and they all need names so come prepared!

At the same time as caring for the baby salmon on site, the KICS is also welcoming hundreds of local school children for their annual salmon fry release field trip season. Field trips began in April and will continue into the middle of June. An estimated 1,500 people will have participated in these award-winning education programs. Thanks, and appreciation go out to the 6 staff members and 2 teacher candidates from UBCO who do such an amazing job teaching these kids about some of the wonders in our watershed.

#### The History of the Jumble Dance

While some details about the origin of the Jumble Dance are consistent, the exact year it began remains uncertain. We do know that the Kingfisher Community Society was established and built the community hall in 1949. The idea for the dance is credited to Eva New. The earliest known photo of the event dates back to 1955, though there are suggestions it may have started earlier in the 1950s.

At that time, alcohol was not allowed in the hall, so the men often gathered outside for a drink. A local resident recently revealed that the women were also discreetly drinking in the women's bathroom. The tradition of cross-dressing began as a playful way to encourage more dancing—women, dressed as men, could approach the "men," who were dressed as women, to ask them to dance.

Except for one year during the recent pandemic, the Jumble Dance has continued ever since. This is tribute to our community members who have continued the tradition for decades, preserving the spirit of fun and creativity.



One memorable story from an early Jumble Dance, shared in Kingfisher Stories by Eva Monkhouse, goes like this:

Russell Large, exceptional for his taste in feminine finery, caught the roving eye of George Cargill, who incidentally retained his masculine dress. George, who had been on the outs with Russell for many years but did not recognize him, asked him to dance. Russell, in true maidenly coyness graciously accepted. During the dance full realization came to George. 'Hell,' he said, 'I don't want to dance with you. You're Russell Large!' and left him in the middle of the floor.

We would like to inform you that partial harvesting cooperations are set to resume in the area accessed from Beattie Road and Holiday Creek Forest Service Road. These activities will once again be carried out by our trusted logging contractor, Balcaen Consolidated Contracting, who managed the previous phase of the work.

We anticipate that the associated hauling operations will take approximately eight weeks to complete, depending on weather conditions and operational progress. Our hours of operation will be from 4:00 am to 2:00pm. We anticipate beginning to move logs around May 12, weather and road conditions permitting as rain is currently in the forecast.
